History of SSA

The Student Success Act was signed into law in 2019. SSA provides additional state funds to expand participation in the School Breakfast and National School Lunch Programs by:

- Making it more financially feasible for sponsors to participate in the Community Eligibility Program (CEP);
- Providing Expanded Income Eligibility Guidelines up to 300% of the federal poverty level; and
- Serving Breakfast After the Bell in schools with 70% or greater free and reduced-price eligible students.

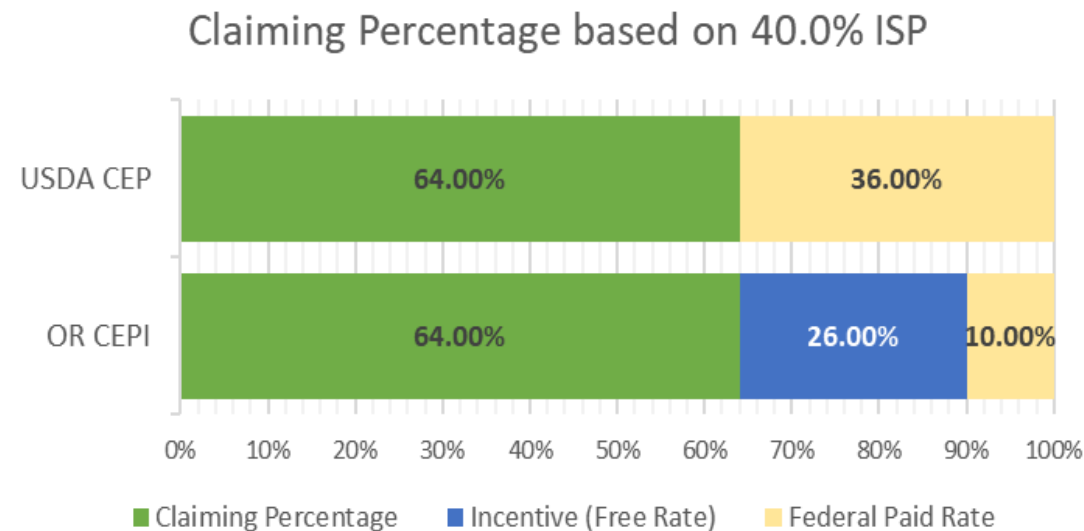

Benefits of CEPI

Financially Feasible

- Allows all enrolled students breakfast and lunch at no charge with reimbursement at the free rate up to 90%



Oregon Expanded Income Guidelines

- Expands eligibility to student's with household income up to 300% of the federal poverty level
- Applies to all public schools, ESD's and public charter schools that are not operating Community Eligibility Programs

How Does EIG Work?

Eligibility Categories:

- Free (Federal)
- Reduced-Price (Federal)
- Oregon EIG (State)
- Paid (Federal)



Determining Eligibility for Federal Free/Reduced Priced Meals

Step 1

- Process the household application for eligibility for federally free meals. If they Qualify **STOP** here. The student is eligible for federally free meals. If not, proceed to step 2

Step 2

- Process the household application for eligibility of federally reduced-price meals. If they qualify, **STOP** here. The student is eligible for federally reduced-price meals. If they do not qualify at this point. The student is denied federally and Oregon EIG must be considered.

How EIG Works (continued)

Once the student's application has been determined 'denied' federally, sponsors would then move to the Oregon Expanded Income Guidelines.



Oregon Expanded Income Guideline (EIG)

Oregon students qualify for EIG meals at no charge² if the household income falls at or below the limits on this chart and above the limits on the Federal Reduced Price Meal chart.

Breakfast After the Bell

Requires:

- Schools with 70% F/RP eligible students must make breakfast available after the bell, up to a half hour prior to lunch service
- Implementation as of July 1, 2022

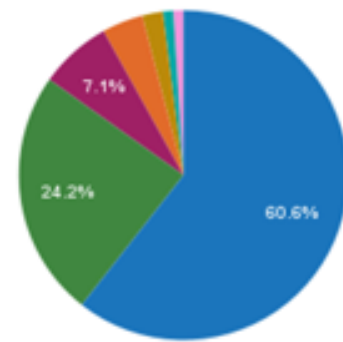

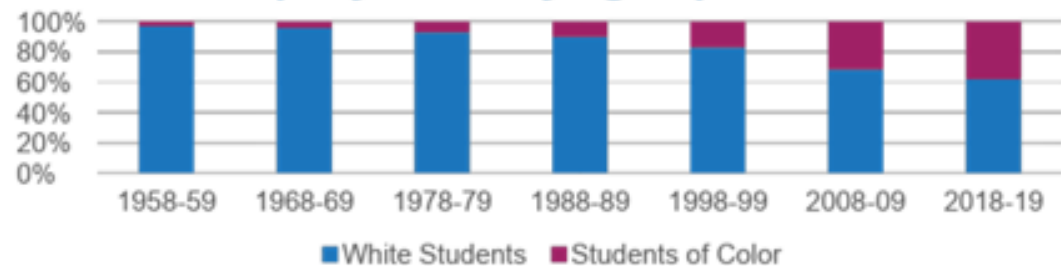
Student Diversity
